Domestic Violence in Sacramento County July 2024 - June 2025



8,544 survivors contacted WEAVE's 24/7 Support Line. Callers were supported with safety planning, advocacy, information about WEAVE and community resources. All callers received emotional support in identifying the options that will work best for them.



Associate Therapists provided individual and group counseling to 1,657 survivors of domestic violence. Counseling services are available in multiple languages and available during day and evening hours.



WEAVE provided safety planning, advocacy, and/or accompaniment services to 3,656 survivors through its Midtown Services Center and advocates embedded at community partner locations.



WEAVE's Emergency Safehouse Program and Transitional Housing provided 16,695 bednights of emergency shelter to 166 adult & child victims of domestic violence.


All residents had access to voluntary supportive services including case management, counseling, advocacy, legal assistance, and financial empowerment services.





Ages of Survivors

WEAVE primarily served adult survivors between 21 and 50 years (80%). Older adult survivors seeking services continues to increase with survivors between 51 and 60 years representing 10% of survivors served and those over 61 years representing 4%. Children and youth (6%) served through domestic violence programs are primarily children staying with their parent in WEAVE's Safehouse or Transitional Housing programs.

Relationship Status of Survivors

The relationship status of the domestic violence survivors served were very diverse. One-third (34%) identified as single at the time of seeking services, while 31% were married, and 24% were in an intimate relationship with the abuser. Ten percent of those seeking services were separated or divorced and 1% were widowed.





Education Level of Survivors

The education level of survivors varies with 15% of survivors served having obtained a college degree while 36% had some college or vocational experience, 39% had completed high school and 10% did not have a high school diploma or GED.

40% of survivors receiving in person services report living with a disability or access or functional need.

WEAVE provided services in eight languages. WEAVE ensures language access by employing multilingual staff and through interpreter services.
